# Law<sub>and</sub> History Review

The Law and History Review is the scholarly journal of the American Society for Legal History and the leading legal history journal in the United States. Established in 1983 to further research and writing in the fields of the social history of the law and the history of legal ideas and institutions, the Review appears three times a year (Spring, Summer, and Fall). It is published for the ASLH by the University of Illinois Press.

The *Review* features articles, essays, commentaries and book reviews by international scholars. Content is not limited by place, perspective or period and ranges across all aspects of legal history and culture, from European and American to Australian subjects, and from classical antiquity to the twentieth century. The *Review* is, however, predominantly anglophone in orientation, with concentrations in medieval and early modern European (predominantly British) legal history; American history (all periods); and 19th/20th Century British, Canadian, and Australian legal history. These concentrations reflect the predominant scholarly orientation of the field of legal history in the anglophone world.

Annual individual subscriptions, including membership in ASLH, are \$50 (non-U.S. \$60). Institutional subscriptions are \$65 (non-U.S. \$75). Emeritus and student subscriptions are \$15.


